Environmental License Tag Grants. Grants encourage teachers and youth leaders to develop effective environmental education programs, environmental projects and/or strategies, the Oklahoma Environmental Quality Education Committee, working with the Department of Environmental Quality, offers grants each fall. Oklahoma teachers, public or private (Pre K – 12), school environmental clubs, youth group leaders, and/or organizations with a youth component are eligible to apply for the grant. Applicants may apply for amounts from \$200 up to \$1,000 per grant. Categories include: Environmental Club Projects, Outdoor Classroom Revitalization, Recycling, Composting, Edible Gardens, Environmental Education Projects, or Green Schools. Sponsored by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, to support environmental education projects that increase the public's awareness about environmental issues and provide them with the skills to take responsible actions to protect the environment. Local educational institutions, state agencies and non-profit groups are eligible to apply. These grants cannot be used for structure construction and 25% cash or in-kind matching donation is required. Amount: minimum of \$15,000 and the maximum is \$100,000, subject to the availability of funds. Timeframe: EPA will accept proposals for one or 2 year project periods, but the total funding will be the same regardless of the project period. The deadline for applications varies from year to year. The RFP (request for proposals) usually comes out sometime during the summer, with the deadline in the fall. Grants require youth teams to identify critical issues in their communities, develop activities to address these issues, and educate other young people and children on ways to model community service. Margaret Annis Boys Trust Fund. This program provides support and encouragement for landscaping and beautification projects in parks, medians and other public lands in the Oklahoma City area.
